**Intention to Designate a Property / Ontario Heritage Act**

The Council of the City of Markham intends to designate the following property for reasons of cultural heritage value or interest pursuant to the *Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter O.18, Part IV*:

Alec and Emily Armstrong House  
7831 Highway 7 East  
Markham, ON

The Alec and Emily Armstrong House has design and physical value as a representative example of a late-nineteenth century vernacular farmhouse updated with an early twentieth century Edwardian veranda. The Alec and Emily Armstrong House has historical value for its association with Locust Hill Farm and with Edwin Alexander Armstrong and Emily Edith (Scott) Armstrong of Locust Hill. The historic dwelling is revealing of the rural development pattern whereby secondary dwellings were constructed on farms intended for the use of family members. The property also has value for its association with the early development of Locust Hill. Further, the property has contextual value as one of a grouping of late-nineteenth and early-twentieth century buildings that are important in defining, maintaining and supporting the character and extent of the historic hamlet of Locust Hill.
