

**NOTICE**  
**Intention to Designate a Property / Ontario Heritage Act**

The Council of the City of Markham intends to designate the following property for reasons of cultural heritage value or interest pursuant to the *Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990*, Chapter O.18, Part IV:

Jacob Wismer House  
46 Timbermill Crescent  
Markham, ON

The Jacob Wismer House has design and physical value as a good representative example of a mid-nineteenth century frame Pennsylvania German farmhouse, and a locally rare example of a two-storey building of plank-on-plank construction. The Jacob Wismer House has historical value and associative value, representing the locally significant theme of Pennsylvania German Mennonites being attracted to Markham in the early nineteenth century, and for its direct association with Jacob Wismer, a prominent member of the Wismer family of Mount Joy-Quantztown. Further, the property has contextual value because it is physically, functionally, visually and historically linked to its surroundings where it has stood since c.1840.
